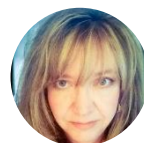

Donor Care in Action: Lessons from a Tertiary ICU Unit and Telemedicine-Driven Training

No Organ Left Behind: Persistence, Precision, and Progress in Lung Allocation

Every viable lung deserves a chance. This session examines how relentless utilization efforts are reducing waitlist mortality, the complexities of remote centralized ex vivo lung perfusion, lungs transplanted after list exhaustion, and a comparison of static cold storage versus controlled hypothermic storage in EVLP outcomes. Attendees will leave with insight into how persistence and advanced preservation strategies are keeping more lungs in play and more patients off the waitlist.



Learning Objectives:

- Describe advanced lung allocation and preservation strategies, including ex vivo lung perfusion (EVLP), remote centralized perfusion models, and comparisons of static cold storage versus controlled hypothermic preservation, and their impact on lung utilization and waitlist mortality.
- Discuss the application of evidence-informed principles of persistence and precision in donor lung management to interdisciplinary decision-making processes that expand allocation opportunities and improve transplant outcomes.

Persistent Support, Persistent Gaps and Targeted Messaging to Reduce Donor Deregistration: What 30 Years of National Survey Data Means for the OPO Community

This session examines more than 30 years of nationally representative HRSA survey data to understand persistent trends—and enduring gaps—in public attitudes and behaviors related to organ donation, with a focus on implications for OPO practice and targeted messaging to reduce donor deregistration.
